

Medicaid Is a Powerful Lifeline for Seniors in Illinois

Medicaid is a critical lifeline providing health coverage to low-income seniors who would not otherwise be able to afford health care. In Illinois, Medicaid covers over 200,000 seniors.¹ Illinois's population is aging and with life expectancies on the rise, Medicaid is increasingly critical for the health of our state.²

• Medicaid is vital for nursing home care for seniors

In Illinois, Medicaid covers 3 in 5 nursing home residents—that's about 55,000 people.³ Medicaid covers most individuals who need nursing home care long term—Medicare covers only 100 days or fewer.⁴ The median nursing home costs \$64,000 per year—a sum that quickly depletes the savings of all but the most wealthy.⁵ Medicaid is the only option for seniors to access long term care that would be far too expensive without coverage.

Medicaid also helps seniors stay independent in their communities

Illinois has a Medicaid Home and Community-Based Services (HCBS) waiver specifically for seniors. This waiver covers services like help with cleaning and self-care, adult day care, and emergency home response, allowing seniors to live in their homes and communities and maximize their independence and self-determination. Home care also saves Illinois money because it costs less than institutional care.

Medicare alone doesn't cover everything seniors need

While some people think Medicare is enough to cover all seniors' health care needs, Medicare has costs, including premiums, deductibles, and copayments that fixed, low-income seniors cannot afford. Medicaid covers those costs. In 2013, more than 220,000 low-income Illinoisans age 65 and older on Medicare also received these vital Medicaid benefits.⁷

• Cutting Medicaid is an attack on women

Senior women are nearly twice as likely as men to live in poverty and that gap widens dramatically with age. More than two-thirds of seniors who receive Medicaid are women. Women are more likely than men to depend on Medicaid for long-term care in nursing homes and in-home care services: 3 out of 4 nursing home residents and 2 out of 3 home health care recipients are women.⁸

Currently, seniors make up 6% of the Medicaid population but use 19% of the Medicaid spending. Per capita caps under the American Health Care Act would slash funding for Medicaid, forcing Illinois to shoulder a significantly greater costs in a budget that already falls short of meeting our needs.
